DANIEL SMITH

STORY OF IMPACT



"I'm convinced that what Junior Achievement is doing is going to change the world." Daniel Smith, a Kansas City media creator, shared following his first visit to the JA Youth Learning Lab, presented by the Mallouk Family Foundation. "I'm not much of a crier, but I'll admit I cried when I saw the space for the first time."

Daniel's desire to get involved with JA led him to volunteer in a deeply personal and impactful way –serving as a Career Speaker at the Johnson County Juvenile Detention Center (JDC). Daniel shared his personal experience of being at JDC when he was younger, and how for nearly a decade, he's been looking for a way to go back to share lessons learned and "pay it forward." JA created an opportunity for Daniel to serve as a mentor sharing a connection with the youth through a lived experience. As a teenager, Daniel was seeking guidance to find a path forward, but the system didn't offer that as part of the rehabilitation process. *"When I was there, there wasn't a sense of redemption. There wasn't a sense of bettering yourself. But for these kids, it's different. JA's giving them an opportunity."*

Regardless of their differences, Daniel knows that a sense of belonging is what young people are seeking. By sharing his personal story, he saw that sense of belonging click, that maybe there was a future for these young people they didn't see before. *"When youth get a chance to realize there's something different to do, and someone different you can be, regardless of decisions you've made in the past, we'll have a better society as a whole."*

I'm convinced that what Junior Achievement is doing is going to change the world.

Daniel reflects on his gratitude for the impact Junior Achievement has on young people, sharing that he feels that Junior Achievement provides a head start for them. *"Within a couple of years, students who participate in Junior Achievement will be on a completely different playing field than their peers.*" He continues, reflecting on how middle school Daniel would have been had he had JA: *"Had JA been a thing when I was young, I would have known that what I'm interested in could be a career path, and been confident in making that happen sooner.*"



KANSAS CITY KANSAS PUBLIC SCHOOLS STORY OF IMPACT

"Opportunities for partnership with Junior Achievement and implementation into our curriculum are endless," says Lisa Martinez, Assistant Director of Diploma+, Kansas City Kansas Public School District. After working with JA for seven years, Kansas City Kansas (KCK) Public Schools developed a comprehensive partnership plan to embed and implement Junior Achievement programming across the K-12 learning journey.

"More than half of the district's 22,000 students will be impacted because of Junior Achievement programming throughout every grade level," says Martinez. Adding relevance to what students are learning in the classroom, providing realworld applications, and giving educators the opportunity to answer the age-old question of, "Why is this important?" were reasons to expand the partnership.

"To be able to take students to a place of learning and bring curricular resources from Junior Achievement into the classroom to show students why -that's what brings the vision to life that students can change how their community works."

Martinez sees partnership with Junior Achievement as a catalyst for changing the future of the Kansas City business and community landscape. "Because students are experiencing more innovative learning, they'll be able to create innovative workspaces, and perform jobs we don't currently know are available." She notes that it's not just about the workplace skills either, but rather what JA can help students do for the community. "In 25 years, we'll see shifts in our community makeup, increased financial stability, more engaged local government and constituents -all because Junior Achievement is part of influencing students from the beginning."



Special thanks to our JA BizTown supporters who create opportunities for real world learning and a lot of fun!







ALPHAPOINTE

STORY OF IMPACT

Outside of the classroom, Junior Achievement of Greater Kansas City (JA) partners with community organizations across Kansas City. One such organization, Alphapointe, appreciates the collaboration because of the benefits the students received and how JA's programs provided expert-level curriculum.

"It was so beneficial that the program was already created. I no longer had to rely on Google to piece meal a program together –JA already had exactly what I needed," says Lexi Holsapple, Youth Programs Specialist.

JA curriculum was implemented into the Alphapointe Summer Transitional Employment Program serving high school seniors and post-secondary students who are visually impaired or blind. JA customized a curriculum that was exactly what was needed for these students.

"Because Junior Achievement already had the program, it allowed us time to report back outcomes to the state and make sure we had the administrative guidelines taken care of for maximum student impact," says Holsapple.

Alphapointe wanted options to dig deeper on topics such as personal finance, soft skills, job preparation and interviewing, career exploration, leadership skills, and resume building, but they needed help. Holsapple notes just how vital JA's expertise is to their students' futures: *"They'll be so much more prepared and aware of different tools and resources and knowledge that they will need in their future."*

They were able to immediately take their learnings and implement it into their jobs. Utilizing JA's experiential learning approach, including collaborative discussion and real-world application, the students were quickly invested in the lessons and applied the skills during their concurrent job placement. "They were able to immediately take their learnings and implement it into their jobs." In addition, the program content was relevant for the students, which got them excited about learning. "It wasn't a hassle for the students. They were all excited for JA Day."

JA and Alphapointe are already planning for next year's partnership and inviting more students to participate in the programs. After seeing the outcomes and benefits of the Junior Achievement programs, Holsapple encourages other organizations to collaborate with JA. *"I could not recommend the program and its real-world impacts more."*

STORY OF IMPACT

Eli Gale, 7, is a first grader at Académie Lafayette. He was first introduced to JA programming during summer school this past summer, where he participated in a series of lessons in the JA Our Families program. This program introduces concepts and lessons about how jobs and businesses contribute to the well-being of families and communities. This foundational program is part of a continuum of elementary experiences preparing students for future economic mobility.

"He came home excited to take his certificate and his activity sheets out of his backpack," says Eli's dad, Derek. "Not everything makes it out the backpack, but he came home every day saying how fun the sessions were."

Supporting teachers is important and Junior Achievement is doing that every day.

Derek and his wife's highest hopes for Eli are that he becomes an active, engaged, contributing member of his community and they believe that Junior Achievement is a key to making this happen. With continued exposure to concepts like financial literacy, community and civic engagement, and career readiness, they feel confident Eli will be able to move forward with more understanding than if he were to not have JA. "We're privileged to be able to model some of these concepts in our home, but with JA reinforcing these concepts, especially from a community volunteer standpoint, we know he'll find a path that is a good mix of where his skills and his interests intersect."

In addition, the Gales believe that JA is a vital piece to community support of educators, especially from a hyper-local standpoint. "Supporting Junior Achievement, both through volunteering and donating, is a really positive way of the Kansas City community coming out and saying, 'Our community supports our KC schools and teachers." Noting an overall teacher shortage and a continued list of responsibilities added to educators' plates, Derek says, "Finding ways to support teachers is important. Anything we can do to provide support to them, especially curricular support, is vital. And Junior Achievement is doing that every day."
